Lease/Rental Disclosure Chart

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REALTORS® know very well the importance, and the complexity, of the various state and federal disclosure laws governing real estate transactions in California. Lease/Rental Disclosure Chart is designed to provide REALTORS® and their clients with an easy-to-use reference guide for determining the applicability of these laws to the lease and rental transactions most commonly handled by real estate agents. Leases with an option to purchase and long-term ground leases are treated like sales transactions, not leases, for disclosure purposes. Furthermore, this chart does not address the disclosure requirements for non-residential lease transactions.

Carbon Monoxide Detector Compliance	The landlord or agent must maintain carbon monoxide detector devices in each dwelling unit if the rental unit has a fossil fuel burning heater or appliance, fireplace, or an attached garage on or before July 1, 2011 for a single-family unit and on or before Jan. 1, 2013 for all other existing dwelling units. Death (in last 3 years)	The landlord or agent has no liability for not disclosing the fact of any death of an occupant that occurred more than 3 years prior to the date the tenant offers to lease or rent the property. Any death which has occurred within a 3-year period should be disclosed if deemed to be "material." Affliction with	C.A.R. Form SSD or SPQ may be used.	Cal. Civ. Code § 1710.2. 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	<p>AIDS or death from AIDS, no matter when it occurred, need not be voluntarily disclosed.</p> <p>Neither a landlord nor an agent may make an intentional misrepresentation in response to a direct question concerning deaths on the property. The landlord or agent may simply refuse to answer a question (about HIV or AIDS) indicating that any such information, if known, is confidential and private.</p>		
<p>Default Notice</p>	<p>Every landlord who offers for rent residential 1 to 4 property must disclose in writing the default notice prior to signing the lease agreement</p> <p>A property manager will not be held liable for failing to deliver the written notice unless the manager receives instructions in writing from the landlord to deliver it.</p> <p>The effective date is January 1, 2013.</p>	<p>The notice must be substantially in the form as written in Cal. <p>Disability Access Inspection Disclosure for Commercial Properties</p>	<p>A commercial property owner or landlord must state on every lease or rental agreement executed on or after July 1, 2013 whether the leased premises has been inspected by a Certified Access Specialist (CAsp), and whether the property has or has not been determined to meet all applicable construction-related accessibility standards for the disabled pursuant to Cal. Foreclosure Notice	At the same time that a Notice of Trustee's Sale is being posted on residential property, the trustee or authorized agent must post this foreclosure notice on the property and the mortgagee, trustee, beneficiary, or authorized agent must also mail this notice in an envelope addressed to the "Resident of property subject to foreclosure sale."	<p>For a copy of this foreclosure notice required by Civil Code Section 2924.8 click here.</p> <p>The above notice is required until the revised notice amendments become operative.</p> <p>A revised foreclosure notice will be required 60 days after the Department of Consumer Affairs posts the revised notice online, or on March 1, 2013, whichever is later</p>	Cal. Lead Hazard Pamphlet	<p>For a lease or rental of all residential property, built before Jan. 1, 1978, the landlord must provide the tenant with a lead hazard information pamphlet, disclose the presence of any known lead-based paint and provide a statement signed by the tenant that the tenant has read the warning statement and has received the pamphlet.</p> <p>Exemptions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • zero-bedroom dwelling (loft, efficiency unit, dorm, or studio) • short-term rental 	<p>Pamphlet: <i>Protect Your Family From Lead In Your Home</i></p> <p>(incorporated in Residential Environmental Hazards: A Guide for Homeowners, Buyers, Landlords and Tenants)</p> <p>C.A.R. Lead Paint Renovation Pamphlet	<p>Prior to commencing renovation a “renovator” must deliver the EPA pamphlet to and receive acknowledgement of receipt from the occupant. <p>Meth Lab Clean-Up Order (Release of Illegal Controlled Substance Remediation Order)</p>	<p>In the event that toxic contamination by an illegal controlled substance has occurred on a property and upon receipt of a notice from the Dept. of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) or a Local Health Officer, the landlord must give a prospective tenant a copy of this order which must be attached to the rental agreement. <p>Mold</p>	<p>There are no current disclosure or inspection requirements until after the Dept. of Health Services (DHS) develops permissible exposure limits for mold and a consumer booklet. <p>Pest Control Notice</p>	<p>The landlord of a residential rental unit must give each tenant a copy of the notice provided by the registered structural pest control company if a contract for periodic pest control service has been signed.</p>		<p>Cal. 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<p>Proposition 65 Warning Notice</p>	<p>The law applies to a "person in the course of doing business" employing 10 or more employees in his or her business.</p>	<p>It is recommended that the landlord post a copy of the Proposition 65 Warning Notice* visible to tenants to avoid potential violations and civil lawsuits since certain chemicals on the list such as tobacco smoke or motor vehicle exhaust may be regularly released into the environment.</p> <p>* "WARNING: THIS FACILITY CONTAINS ONE OR MORE CHEMICALS KNOWN TO THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA TO CAUSE CANCER, BIRTH DEFECTS OR REPRODUCTIVE HARM. 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<p>Smoke Detector Compliance</p>	<p>All existing dwelling units must have a smoke detector centrally located outside each sleeping area (bedroom or group of bedrooms).</p> <p>In addition, new construction (with a permit after Aug. 14, 1992) must have a hard-wired smoke detector in each bedroom.</p> <p>Any additions, modifications, or repairs (after Aug. 14, 1992) exceeding \$1,000 for which a permit is required or the addition of any bedroom will also trigger the requirement of a smoke detector in each bedroom. (These may be battery operated.)</p> <p>LOCAL LAW MAY BE MORE RESTRICTIVE! Check with the local City or County Department of Building and Safety.</p> <p>Beginning January 1, 2016, landlords of residential property must generally install additional smoke alarms as needed to comply with current building standards. Existing alarms need not be replaced unless the alarm is inoperable. New alarms installed may be battery operated if approved by the State Fire Marshall.</p>		<p>Cal. <p>Water Conserving Fixtures Compliance</p>	<p>On and after Jan. 1, 2019, the water-conserving plumbing fixtures must be operating at the manufacturer's rated water consumption at the time that the tenant takes possession.</p>		<p>Cal. Civ. Code § 1101.5(c).</p>

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Water Heater Bracing Compliance	<p>All owners of existing water heaters must brace, anchor or strap water heaters to resist falling or horizontal displacement due to earthquake motion.</p> <p>It is considered a nuisance and a violation of the law if the property does not have the water heater strapped.</p>		<p>Cal.
